

# Epitome hearing puts it closer to construction

## A decision by early summer is likely, followed by a fall groundbreaking

GRAND FORKS — Following Tuesday’s public hearing of Epitome Energy’s air permit application, the soybean crush facility is one step closer to beginning construction in Grand Forks.

Epitome Energy CEO Dennis Egan said he hopes to begin construction this fall, a timeline contingent on the North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality approving the air permit for the facility. The permit is the record that shows the facility meets

state and federal requirements to limit pollution to the environment. According to the preliminary findings from the department, the facility is expected to be well within standards to protect the environment and people. “Air permitting is usually the longest lead time

and the one that takes the longest to get. It can sometimes be the most contentious and may or may not have funding applications associated with it,” said David Stroh, manager of the permit program in the air quality division of the Department of Environ-

mental Quality. Epitome will be getting a Title V air permit — a complex permit for a facility at the scale Epitome requires. Smaller permits, for example, regulate grain elevators with the type and scope of the permit varying on the complexity and size of

the project. If Epitome receives the air permit, it will first receive a provisional construction permit that will eventually transition into a full operational permit. According to Stroh, a decision on the permit

# ALERUS DONATES \$50K TO CHILDREN’S MUSEUM

## The grant will be used for programming at the museum to be built near Choice Health and Fitness

The Grand Forks Children’s Museum took another leap forward Tuesday, April 23, with a \$50,000 grant from Alerus Financial, given in partnership with Federal Home Loan Bank of Des Moines.

This latest contribution will be used for programming at the museum, said Sally Miskavige, vice president of the Grand Forks Children’s Museum Board of Directors.

“It really does help us,” Miskavige said.

The two-story Grand Forks Children’s Museum, occupying 28,000-30,000 square feet, is slated to be built near Choice Health and Fitness on South Washington, on an 8-acre plot of land donated by Altru Health System. The land has been valued at \$4 million.

Members of the museum’s board of directors say they hope to break ground for the facility next spring.

Meanwhile, fundraising for the project is in full swing, with a goal of \$45 million for the building and \$5 million to \$6 million for the endowment. Just over half of the capital fund goal has been met. The level of funding that must be raised before groundbreaking can occur has not been determined, Miskavige said.

The \$50,000 grant from Alerus Financial will support programming at the museum, not the capital campaign. It will fund the development of programming that celebrates local culture and history

through interactive learning. Some programming may take place before the building’s anticipated groundbreaking.

Monies will be used for initiatives such as pop-up events that have been and will be held to engage kids and stir up their excitement, as well as to reach out to the entire community to build understanding of the types of activities the museum will offer.

Funds will also be used, for example, to create a community garden on museum grounds as an environment for multi-generational learning

about the area’s traditional and Indigenous cultures’ crops and plants, as well as other types of multi-generational knowledge-sharing and learning experiences for underserved populations.

“Equity is one of our core values,” Miskavige said.

“Our theme is ‘land and sky,’” said Carmen Wald, a board member and chairperson of the grant-writing committee, noting that learning will begin with plants “all the way to the table or pantry.”

“Or, from farm-to-table and forage-to-table,”

added Hillary Kempenich, also a museum board member, an Anishinaabe multidisciplinary artist and member of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa.

### Destination point

Chris Wolf, Alerus market president, said, “We’re excited to have (the museum) here, not only for us (who live) here, but also for people coming to town.”

The Grand Forks Children’s Museum sees the museum as a destination point and a magnet for families in the region as well as visitors to the area.

“It’s a quality-of-life issue too,” Wolf said. It will offer “something fun to do, and another reason to live in our community.”

He noted his family’s experience visiting a similar facility in Kansas City, where he became more aware of “possibilities we could have here in Grand Forks.”

At that facility, “I enjoyed seeing the excitement of the people attending – people of all ages and backgrounds,” he said, and the shared experience “of just bringing people together.”

## 3 School Board candidates address teachers

GRAND FORKS — The association representing Grand Forks’ public school teachers has endorsed three incumbents and one newcomer for the Grand Forks School Board.

The Grand Forks Education Association backed all three incumbent candidates running for reelection June 11 – Amber Flynn, Jeff Manley, and Eric Lunn – and one newcomer, AE2S Engineering engineer Jay Kleven.

The organization made its announcement in a Wednesday morning Facebook post.

While she said the teachers’ association hadn’t always seen eye-to-eye with the board, “we think we have a pretty decent School Board right now,” GFEA President Melissa Buchhop said.

“We also feel Jay will bring some fresh eyes and a new perspective,” she added, noting Kleven, whose four children have all either attended or graduated from the district, would add the voice of a North End resident to the board.

Flynn, Kleven, and fellow outsider Cameron Murphy participated Tuesday evening in a GFEA forum hosted at Red River High School. The organization began conducting the biennial forum in 2022 in lieu of one-on-one interviews when that election’s 23 candidates made the latter practice impractical, GFEA President Melissa Buchhop said.

Lunn and Manley and perennial candidate Roland Riemers were absent, but submitted

# Fedorchak: ND’s next representative must be a leader

GRAND FORKS — North Dakota doesn’t need a representative that contributes to the drama in the U.S. House of Representatives, says Public Service Commissioner and U.S. House candidate Julie Fedorchak.

“I think what people are hungry for is leadership, and they crave strong leadership in state and in Washington,” Fedorchak said. “I don’t tolerate drama and gamesmanship; there’s

too much of that in Washington, D.C., and the last thing North Dakota should do is send another person to Washington who’s going to fuel and contribute to that drama.”

Fedorchak is one of five candidates running for the Republican nomination for the state’s sole seat in the U.S. House. She currently serves on the state’s Public Service Commission, which oversees the state’s utilities, railroads and pipelines. Of the candidates in the Republican primary, she is the candidate who most

recently won a statewide office, winning a third term to the Public Service Commission in 2022.

“I feel like I stand out as the lead candidate who has a consistent and long record of serving North Dakotans both in business and in public service and delivering conservative results,” Fedorchak said. “Through my service on the Public Service Commission, I have been a leader in ensuring that we have the infrastructure needed to support the industry that creates 60,000 jobs for North Dakota citizens and

contributes more than half of the revenues of the state budget.”

Fedorchak won over 70% of the vote against her Democratic-NPL opponent Melanie Moniz in 2022, and has consistently won at least 65% of the vote in the last three elections for her commission spot.

She says that will translate well into being a leader on key issues, like national security.

“What’s going on at the border is just front and center in the news all the

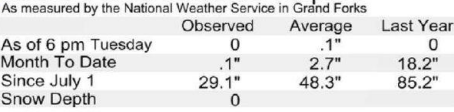

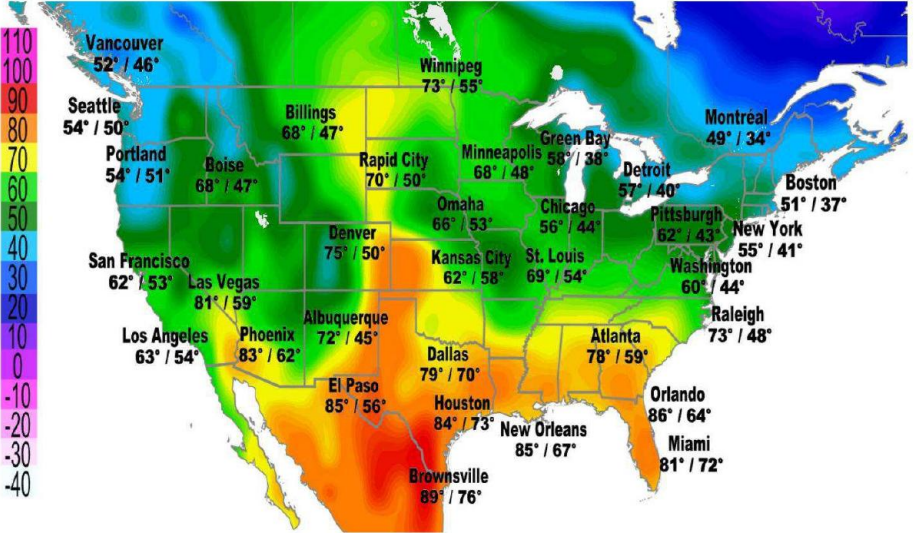

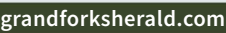

# EERC awarded more than \$11 million for projects

GRAND FORKS — The Energy & Environmental Research Center at the University of North Dakota has been awarded \$11.6 million for research related to enhanced oil recovery and carbon capture.  
The funding was announced Wednesday by

the office of Sen. John Hoeven, R-N.D.  
According to the release from Hoeven, the funds, made available under the Department of Energy’s Office of Fossil Energy and Carbon Management, “will enable EERC to conduct 18 months of field and laboratory research to study

the viability of injecting CO2 into unconventional oil reservoirs for the purposes of enhanced oil recovery and long-term emissions storage.”  
The release said Hoeven, a member of the Senate Energy and Water Development Appropriations Committee, “secured strong support

for the DOE’s oil and gas research programs in annual funding legislation” and also “worked to advance EERC’s application, stressing the project’s benefits to both U.S. energy security and improved environmental stewardship.”  
“The EERC is a world-class research institution

and has been a central player to North Dakota’s efforts to crack the code on CCUS,” Hoeven said. “This latest project will help maximize the full potential of the Bakken by advancing cutting-edge research for unconventional enhanced oil recovery operations, supporting U.S. energy

security by making the best use of our abundant oil and gas reserves. At the same time, this provides a productive use for the CO2 that is being captured at a range of energy facilities in the state, including our coal and biofuel plants.”

## Daughter pays for mother’s abusive behavior

**D**ear Amy: Have I been gaslighted?  
My mother was a difficult person. She was often not nice to my sister-in-law.  
I admired my SIL for taking the high road and for being respectful toward my mother, and I told her so many times.  
I bumped heads big time with my mother, too, but had a good last six years when she moved near me and dementia mellowed her out.  
My mother died five years ago and my sister-in-law reminds me often of how awful she was (my brother has no fond memories of childhood, and lets his wife do the talking).  
The last time my SIL brought this up, I stopped her and said that although her experiences are valid, this is my mother and she is dead now, and I find it offensive to keep hearing about it.  
I validated her feelings and told her again how much I admired her.  
Initially she apologized, but afterward apparently decided that I was wrong. She is now quite angry with me, and said she prefers to work through this in therapy. After I tried to reach out, she says she doesn’t want to talk about it.  
I care for her and I like her, my brother and their children, but I’m upset about this.

I feel like making me the bad guy here is gaslighting.  
What do you think? – Gaslit?  
**Dear Gaslit?:** I think this only qualifies as gaslighting if you actually believe that you’re the “bad guy.” You don’t believe this, because you aren’t.  
The only thing I think you might have done differently would be if you had altered your own wording when responding.  
Instead of saying that your sister-in-law’s remarks about your mother were “offensive,” you might have said how this made you feel: i.e. “Now that mom is gone, I feel so sad continuing to hear about how awful she was to you.”  
I believe that speaking the truth about abuse or toxic behavior of family members (even after they have died) is valid and can be helpful – even if it brings up painful feelings. Doing so can help people resolve the sometimes impossible duality of being the child of an abusive person.  
Your mother treated people badly. And yet, she

was still your mother.  
For your sister-in-law, talking this through in therapy (instead of with you) is exactly what she should be doing.  
A skilled therapist will help her to figure out who the “bad guy” is and should lead her not to punish you for your mother’s sins.  
You have been extremely kind and gracious to her in the past, and I hope you will continue. You also have every right to hold your own good memories of your mother; it sounds like you are lucky to have them.  
**Dear Amy:** My boyfriend and I are in our late-teens and we recently learned that I am pregnant.  
We have a lot to deal with but we are doing our best to handle this situation that neither of us really feel ready for. We both have great families and they are supportive.  
We saw my boyfriend’s sister last weekend, and she told me that she wants to go with us to our doctor appointment so that when we learn the gender of our child she can then host a “gender reveal” party. (She is married and has a child.)  
I know that some parents do this, but I don’t think I want to do it.  
Should she come with us to the appointment? Should we let her do this? – Nervous  
**Dear Nervous:** No –

and no.  
You and the baby’s father should go to these appointments. If you would like more support at an appointment, you could invite her or another family member, but this invitation should come from you – not the other way around.  
Establishing respectful boundaries can be a tough job. But this is the beginning of your life as parents, and you have the right and responsibility to develop good boundaries and good judgment about what you believe is best for you and your child.  
**Dear Amy:** “Wondering” asked if her husband should incentivize his adult daughters to lose weight.  
I can tell you from experience that he should stay out of it.  
Why? It’s none of his business.  
My father was obsessed with my weight during my entire life and brought it up whenever he saw me. After he died, I lost 40 pounds.

**Brainerd man dies in single-vehicle crash**  
BRAINERD — A 63-year-old Brainerd man died Tuesday, April 23, after his vehicle went off the road on County Highway 8 in Crow Wing County.  
Crow Wing County Sheriff’s Lt. Craig Katzenberger said the sheriff’s office responded to the crash at 6:13 p.m. in Maple Grove Township, near the 10000 block of County Highway 8 in southeastern Crow Wing County. Katzenberger said a 2002 Jeep was traveling eastbound on the highway when it went off the road and hit an approach in the west ditch before coming to rest in the ditch.  
The man’s iPhone originally reported the crash, sending a crash alert to authorities. A

passerby also reported the crash, finding the car in the ditch.  
First on scene were Zone 1 first responders, who found the man responsive in the vehicle. While attempting to help him from the vehicle, the man became unresponsive and CPR was performed.  
The driver was not identified Wednesday morning, pending family notification. The man’s body was sent to the Ramsey County Medical Examiner’s office to determine the cause of death. Assisting at the scene of the crash were the Minnesota State Patrol, Garrison Fire Department and North Memorial Health Ambulance.

Now it’s up to lawmakers to protect kids from social media

From state capitols to Washington, D.C., lawmakers are scrambling to come up with regulations that can protect kids from the potential harms of social media, since the platforms have been unwilling to adopt reasonable safeguards themselves.  
In just the last few months, Florida passed a law banning children under 14 from having a social media account, Iowa legislators backed a bill that would require children under 18 to get parental permission to set up and use a social media account, and Colorado legislators passed a bill that would require platforms to display pop-up warnings on kids’ accounts after an hour of use.  
A dozen other states, including California, are considering or have passed laws that would force companies to design their platforms to be safer for kids. Changes could include stricter privacy settings, limiting data collection and

targeted ads, and removing features that encourage kids to stay online longer, such as infinite scroll and autoplay, which automatically launches a new video when one ends. Congress is also working on bipartisan legislation with similar measures to require social media companies to enact safeguards to protect children.  
This legislation is driven by a growing understanding that social media apps can be addictive and are dangerous to children’s mental health. The American Psychological Association urged again this month that policymakers require that tech companies reduce the risks embedded in the platforms.  
Yet the drive for regulation is facing stiff pushback from the tech industry, which has lobbied against the bills and filed lawsuits to block new legislation from taking effect, arguing the laws are unconstitutional. California’s first-in-the-nation law to require that social media platforms be designed to protect children

was blocked last fall by a federal judge who said the law likely violates the 1st Amendment rights of the tech companies that it seeks to regulate.  
With California’s first attempt held up in court, lawmakers are trying again this year.  
Senate Bill 976 by Sen. Nancy Skinner (D-Berkeley) would require that social media platforms essentially turn off their algorithms for users under 18 and instead serve them content through a chronological feed from people they follow and information that they’ve searched for. The algorithms are designed to feed users a steady stream of content they didn’t necessarily ask for that keeps them on the app, which is why the algorithms have been called addictive. That content may be more dangerous or extreme than what the user initially searched for or not age-appropriate.  
The bill is sponsored by Attorney General Rob Bonta, who sued Meta last year

alleging the company used harmful and “psychologically manipulative product features,” such as “likes,” infinite scroll and constant alerts, to hook young people on Instagram and Facebook and keep them engaged for as much time as possible in order to boost profits.  
SB 976 attempts to curtail some of those features. It would bar platforms from sending notifications to children between 12 a.m. and 6 a.m., and require that social media platforms give parents the ability to change the settings on their kids’ accounts, such as turning off notifications and setting time limits on usage. Parents could allow kids to opt in to the algorithmic feed or turn off restrictions.  
These are reasonable safeguards and much less restrictive than proposals in other states, yet tech industry groups have opposed the bill. They argue that a chronological feed is no safer for children than an algorithmic feed; bad

actors could flood a chronological feed with low quality or harmful content that bury posts from family or friends. They also said the bill will run up against the same 1st Amendment challenges as other laws because, along with limiting a minor’s ability to access and share information, it would impede adults’ access to lawful content because adults would have to prove their age to use the less restricted algorithmic feed and settings.  
It’s likely that any law attempting to put guardrails on social media platforms will face legal challenges. This is complex legal and regulatory terrain, but that’s exactly why California lawmakers should keep pushing ahead with SB 976 and similar efforts. The tech industry has been unwilling to voluntarily change its practices to protect children. Lawmakers have to do it for them.

Before we launch a GoFundMe page for Caitlin Clark, who will make a comparatively paltry \$76,535 as a WNBA rookie this season, consider that the basketball phenom is poised to sign an eight-figure endorsement deal with Nike that will include her own signature shoe.  
Caitlin Clark will be just fine. It’s the other women’s basketball players we should be worried about.  
Remember, the WNBA is the same league that features Phoenix Mercury star Brittney Griner, who in 2022, spent nearly 300 days in a Russian jail after being wrongfully detained on a trumped-up drug smuggling charge.  
The only reason Griner was even in Russia was because she couldn’t make enough money playing the game she loves in her own country — and she is one of the higher paid players.



million viewers on ESPN.  
But paying women basketball players what they deserve doesn’t mean paying them what men make. And it’s not sexist to say so.  
Neither is it sexist to say that most men — and women — prefer to watch the NBA.  
Comparing what WNBA players make to NBA salaries is like comparing apples and tractor trailer parts.  
The name of the game is revenue, and the men’s game generates much more of it. The WNBA has a TV contract worth \$60 million.  
The NBA’s contract is worth \$2.7 billion.  
How much bigger is that? It’s like standing Wembanyama next to Dawn Staley.  
Staley just won her third national title as coach of the University of South Carolina, beating Clark and the University of Iowa in a game that drew 18.9 million viewers, the most-watched women’s basketball game of all time  
“Caitlin Clark is the sole reason why viewership has shot through the roof for our game — the sole reason,” Staley said.  
That’s high praise from a woman who is already in the Basketball Hall of Fame.  
Clark’s presence in the game has been a slam dunk, which appears to be the only thing she can’t do.

to push new boundaries and inspire us all,” the president posted on his X account.  
“But right now we’re seeing that even if you’re the best, women are not paid their fair share. It’s time that we give our daughters the same opportunities as our sons and ensure women are paid what they deserve.”  
Clark will pocket \$338,056 over four years under her contract with the WNBA’s Indiana Fever.  
In contrast, last year’s No. 1

NBA draft pick —7 foot, 4 inch Victor Wembanyama — secured a \$55 million, four-year contract.  
In fact, the NBA’s lowest paid player, Mouhamed Gueye of the Atlanta Hawks makes a little more than \$1.1 million, a sum that still dwarfs most WNBA salaries.  
“Steph Curry makes more per game than what Caitlin Clark is making for 4 years!” journalist Lisa Ling wrote on Instagram. “With the toll sports and travel take on

women’s bodies, is this even a living wage?”  
Of course Clark should be making more. As a legend at the University of Iowa, Clark made history as the NCAA’s Division I all-time leading scorer.  
More importantly, her play has increased interest and viewership of the game.  
Her first-round pick helped to drive a 304% increase in viewership for the WNBA draft this week, shattering previous ratings records with 2.46

# Grand Forks man charged with attempted murder after allegedly strangling coworker with extension cord

GRAND FORKS — A Grand Forks man has been charged with attempted murder and other violent crimes after allegedly strangling his coworker on Monday, April 22.

Alexander Antonio Thompson, 27, got into a physical altercation with a coworker at their workplace, according to an affidavit filed in the case. While on top of the coworker, Thompson allegedly put his hands around the man’s throat, squeezing and restricting airflow.

After the two were separated, Thompson allegedly retrieved an electrical extension cord and wrapped it around the

man’s neck while he was walking away.

Witnesses said they observed the man’s eyes rolling backward in his head, the affidavit said. He lost consciousness.

While strangling him, Thompson allegedly said, “I’m going to kill you.”

Several coworkers had to intervene before Thompson released the man, the affidavit said.

Thompson is charged with Class A felony attempted murder, which has a maximum 20-year sentence. He’s also charged with two counts of Class C felony aggravated assault.

His initial court appearance is scheduled for 9 a.m. on Wednesday, April 24.

# Suboxone strips allegedly smuggled into county jail

GRAND FORKS — Suboxone film strips, hidden inside greeting card envelopes, were smuggled into the Grand Forks County Correctional Center, according to court documents.

On April 15, the Grand Forks County Sheriff’s Office received a report from the correctional facility that a few days earlier, a piece of mail sent to an inmate was inspected and staff located “small, orange tab-like” stickers inside the envelope’s seam, according to a probable cause statement filed in a resulting criminal case.

Each strip had an “A8” inscription, which is

commonly associated with Suboxone, the statement said. Suboxone is a medication made up of buprenorphine and naloxone, and is used to treat opioid disorder. It’s available in tablet and film strip forms; the latter dissolves inside the mouth.

An informant at the correctional center said Andrew Harlan Stenerson was arranging for Suboxone strips to be sent to inmates within his unit via greeting card envelopes.

The sheriff’s office discovered communication between Stenerson and Elaine Alexis Longtine.

During a phone call on March 19, Stenerson allegedly told Longtine, “where you lick it, you can’t put it there, either.”

The statement was consistent with where the Suboxone strips were found inside the envelope, the statement said.

Other conversations between Stenerson and Longtine revolved around Suboxone use, Longtine sending Stenerson items in the mail and Stenerson instructing her not to send items at a certain time because “it” would sit over the weekend and dry out, the statement said.

Longtine allegedly responded, “I don’t know how the mail works, I don’t work for the post office.”

Law enforcement learned Longtine had a prescription for Suboxone, the statement said.

On Tuesday, April 23,

Stenerson was charged with Class A felony conspiracy to deliver or possess with intent to deliver a controlled substance in a correctional facility. The crime has a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison.

The affidavit in Stenerson’s case alleges Longtine also committed a similar crime, however; no related charges were filed against her as of late Wednesday morning, April 24.

Stenerson, 32, had his initial court appearance Wednesday morning, during which his bond was set at \$10,000 cash or surety. His preliminary hearing and arraignment are scheduled for 9 a.m. on June 3.

# Crookston woman sentenced to 180 days for theft from employer

POLK COUNTY, Minn. — A Crookston woman was granted a staggered 180-day sentence on Tuesday, April 23, for the crimes of felony theft from an employer and aiding an offender.

Irene Thompson, 42, pleaded guilty to the crimes in February. In exchange, her two remaining charges, felony theft of lost property and felony possession of stolen property, were dismissed.

A proposed plea agreement said the state would argue for no more than 180 days in custody.

New Flyer, Thompson’s previous employer, overpaid her \$137,521.94, according to a probable cause statement filed in the case.

When the money was deposited into her account in December 2022, Thompson left work and never returned, nor did she respond to any attempts the company made to reach her, the statement said.

Thompson told law enforcement she believed

the money was part of her 401K retirement plan, and said she spent most of it but would repay it.

Her retirement plan only had \$14,425.40 in it when she quit, the statement said.

Thompson later said she knew she shouldn’t have spent the money, and turned in what remained, which was \$11,030.

On Tuesday, April 23, Thompson was sentenced to 24 months and two days in custody at the Northwest Regional Correctional Center, though she was only ordered to serve 180 days.

That time can be throughout three years. From July of this year to June of next year, Thompson must serve 20 days in jail and 40 days on electronic home monitoring. She will repeat this process in years two and three.

She has credit for two days served.

Thompson will be on supervised probation for five years. If she violates any conditions, she will be at risk of serving the entire 24 months and two days.

# EGF to consider bringing back building incentive program

EAST GRAND FORKS — The East Grand Forks City Council will consider bringing back a \$100,000 builder incentive program to increase the sale of residential lots in the city. Through this program, the city would provide a \$100,000 no-interest construction loan to a Minnesota contractor in hopes of encouraging the development of more affordable housing.

The program was established several years ago, but was suspended in 2023 when the city ran out of available funds to run it. There is now enough money in the city’s 280 fund — a housing incentive fund — to allow the construction of three homes, but Paul Gorte, East Grand Forks economic development director, said the city has been approached by eight contractors interested in the program.

At its April 23 work session, Gorte asked the City Council to consider authorizing loans to build all eight homes by using funds from other accounts, such as the city’s reserves.

“So it’s not an expenditure, it’s just a loan out of

the program,” Gorte said. “This will encourage the sale of the lots more quickly, as we just talked about.”

City Council President Mark Olstad noted that using \$500,000 from the city’s reserves amounted to 7% of that fund, which would be tied up until the homes were sold.

“I think that’s the main question,” Olstad said. “If we want to do that, is that something that we’re being smart in taking care of the citizens’ money?”

The city’s 280 fund has been depleted in recent years by higher-than-usual tax abatements, said Karla Anderson, the city’s finance director. Today, largely due to the sale of more lots, there is \$196,000 in that fund, and with additional money feeding into the fund from a downpayment assistance fund, the city has an estimated \$376,000 to work with.

Anderson also suggested the city could use its Sunshine Terrace Funds instead of city reserves to fund loans for the additional five lots. There was also discussion about potentially adjusting the

loans from \$100,000 to a lower number, such as \$75,000.

In other council news:

- The council will consider whether to update or replace the Cabela’s billboard in Sherlock Park along Highway 2. A proposed agreement from Newman Outdoor Advertising would convert the existing sign to a digital display billboard with a 25-year location lease with the city. The estimated value of one seven-second ad slot for a full year is \$14,040, or \$1,170 per month. Newman is also offering the city \$2,500 per month to lease the space should the city decide not to use the offered ad space. Plans for the billboard will be sent to the city planning and zoning department for approval prior to going before the council for a vote.
- The city received two bids for a city sidewalk and multi-use trail extension project. The lower bid, which came in 31% below the engineer’s estimate, was from Q3 contracting out of Little Canada, Minnesota. The project has an estimated cost

of \$160,572.86, and would be funded by a carbon reduction grant and state aid maintenance funds.

- The city has identified up to four city lots located in the Waters Edge Second resubdivision to build single family homes through Northstar Neighbors’ Community Land Trust program. Northstar Neighbors, a nonprofit that provides low- and moderate-income housing to northwest Minnesotans who otherwise would be unable to afford homeownership, is requesting a \$10,000 donation from the city per lot. If the City Council decides to move forward with the program, it will need to approve its intent to donate to Northstar Neighbors at a May council meeting.
- The council will consider whether to update the city’s aging sanitary and storm water lift station Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition systems. Public Works Director Jason Stordahl asked the council to begin the process to develop plans to upgrade those systems. In total, the update is expected to cost around \$301,320.



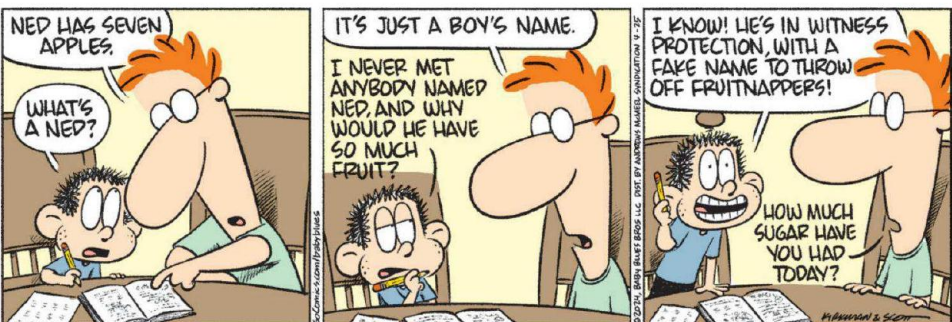

Riders use four-run inning to beat Knights

Red River's starter Griffen Haagenson has 10 strikeouts in 7-5 win over Central

GRAND FORKS — Griffen Haagenson was confident entering Grand Forks Red River's Wednesday rivalry tilt against Grand Forks Central.

It was evident on the mound, as the sophomore righthander struck out 10 and weathered Central's late comeback bid en route to a 7-5 win at Montgomery Field at Oxford Sports Complex Wednesday afternoon.

"It's always fun playing your old teammates, and it's really a rivalry," said Haagenson, who didn't walk a batter. "First conference win is pretty big for us, knowing that we can put the ball in play and really battle."

Entering the game, both Red River and Central had just one win on the season over Sioux Falls Christian. The Knights beat the Chargers 16-0 in four innings and Red River won 12-2 in six.

But wins in the Eastern Dakota Conference have been difficult to come by.

"A win's a win," Riders coach Mark Varriano said. "We got to clean some things up, obviously, but Griffen Haagenson threw a heck of a game. We had some timely hitting, ran the bases pretty well. We just have to learn how to win, and towards the end of the game, you have to learn how to put the pedal down."

Haagenson, who pitched a complete game, also recorded the Roughriders' first hit of the game in the second, then scored on an RBI single to right field from Adrian Gonzalez.

That jump started the Red River offense that put up four runs in the fourth inning. The Riders' seven total runs are the second-most scored by Red River this season.

Central started slow but found its offensive rhythm late in the game, scoring all five runs in the final two innings.

"I'm proud of them for not giving up and rolling over and dying," Central coach Danny Marto said.

Riders roll to fourth-straight win

Red River shoots a 296 behind Kolby Koerner's 72 as Koerner ties for medalist honors

Selective aggressiveness has been a key for Grand Forks Red River golf this year and was a theme for the field at King's Walk Golf Course on Wednesday morning.

It worked out for the Roughriders again as they pulled out their fourth consecutive meet victory this season.

Coming down the 18th fairway, Kolby Koerner had a chip to put him within striking distance for birdie and potentially claim a medalist spot.

Next to him was Porter Seidel of Fargo Davies looking to do the same as he recovered from the greenside bunker to sit inside 5 feet.

Koerner elected to keep his approach short to give himself a little bit longer of a putt — but uphill and more stable than his groupmates.

From just around 10 feet, he nailed the putt and had the one-stroke lead. That lasted all of 20 or so seconds as Seidel converted his sand save for birdie to tie with an equal 72.

"Definitely wanted to play a little conservative here and there," Koerner said. "On 18, hit it short to try and get up and

down for birdie, and if I don't, I make a par and a second-place finish. You have to play safe on the holes with the water because you could make a seven or eight."

With a 296 team gross and three Roughriders finishing in the top five of the individual leaderboard, Red River collected its second sub-300 round of the year behind the consistent efforts from Kolby Koerner, Silas Dusenbury and Ross Koerner.

"You want guys to be aggressive because it's scoreable and you don't have a lot of days set up like this. Everybody is going to be playing pretty aggressive and they should be comfortable to be aggressive being a home course," Red River coach Nathan Olson said.

While King's Walk can normally bring in strong winds and a home turf advantage, when the conditions are what they were like Wednesday morning, it opens the field quite a bit. It is a wide-open track without the wind, and through 11 holes, 18 golfers were within three strokes of first place.

Through those 11 holes, the Koerners and Dusenbury stood even. Kolby and Dusenbury were very consistent throughout the day as they combined for

27 pars.

Kolby was only one-over through the front nine and opened his back nine with a dart on the 10th green within 2 feet for a tap-in birdie.

"I think you have to play it as if it is a windy day still," Koerner said. "You have to hit the green, you have to make a putt here and there. Mainly just hit the green and two-putt is what it is."

Dusenbury was bogey-free throughout the entire back nine until he ran into trouble on 17 and picked up a double bogey, knocking him out of the top individual spot.

Inversely working his way up the leaderboard with a bounce back was Fargo North's Carson Hannestad. He double-bogeyed on hole seven

before birdies on nine and 14. He finished with a 74.

West Fargo's Tanner Wynn and Jack Josephson had up and down days, and while the valleys were low the hills were that much higher. Wynn came in from the turn at five-over with a 42. He would turn in a 32 on the back nine with three straight birdies on 11, 12 and 13.

Josephson carded a 76 while conquering six, seven and 15 with birdies.

"With that selective aggressiveness, you pick a hole where you are downwind or when the pin is at an accessible location and you don't try and force a 200-foot shot over water or pull off a hero shot," Olson said.

Sometimes wide competition like this can come

with a little bit of luck. After a double-bogey on 16, Ross Koerner thought that luck was not on his side. Then coming into 18, his tee shot received a bounce off the cart path and put him within 150 yards of the pin. An up-and-down for eagle essentially erased that double bogey and kept him just one-over on the day for a 73.

"Sometimes things roll out on your side," Olson said.

Dusenbury and Koerners are now at the top of the EDC standings at just over 77 for season averages. Next week, schools will travel to Detroit Lakes for the joint Detroit Lakes-Valley City Invite.

Former NDSU golfer Amy Olson retires from LPGA

There have been plenty of descriptions of Amy Olson's golf game over the years, from champion, NCAA record setter to LPGA Tour player. On Wednesday, add one more: retired.

Fargo's greatest female player since Beverly Hanson in the 1950s announced on social media that she's done with the grind of the tour, officially putting 10

years in the rear view mirror for the next stage of life.

For golf in Fargo-Moorhead and the Red River Valley, it was a historic run.

"Truly, from the age of 8 years old, I gave it everything I had," Olson said. "I spent so much time, so much energy, I made a lot of sacrifices to reach what I believe was my potential. No regrets, I don't think I can look back and say I could have done something different."

It's no surprise. Olson for a while now has said

she didn't plan on pro golf being a multi-decade quest and said several years ago that golf wasn't going to be her everything. Her marriage to North Dakota State assistant football coach Grant Olson and the birth of their daughter, Carly, last fall put the LPGA Tour down on the priority list.

"I wanted it to be a chapter in my life, I didn't want it to be the whole book," Amy said. "I was fortunate to do it for 10 years. I was kind of starting to wind down and obviously Grant and I are just thrilled that

parenthood is in the next chapter but that necessarily wasn't the driving force behind it, I was ready to move on to the next chapter even before we knew we were going to have Carly."

After a standout junior career while growing up on the Oxbow Country Club course, her chapter at North Dakota State included setting an NCAA record with 20 individual tournament victories, breaking the mark of 17 set by Juli Inkster at San Jose State

Former Sheyenne hoops star Jackson  
Moni transferring to NDSU

Forward was a first-team NSIC selection last season at Northern State

FARGO — Jackson Moni is heading home. The West Fargo native announced Wednesday morning that he will transfer to North Dakota State to spend his final season of eligibility playing for the Bison. The 6-foot-10 forward entered the NCAA transfer portal on March 21 after three standout seasons at Northern State in Aberdeen, South Dakota playing for former Bison head coach Saul Phillips.

The day after Moni entered the portal, NDSU offered him. “Obviously, it’s home. It’s nice for me, I wanted to play at the Division One level. I also wanted to be a father figure as well for my six-month old daughter. So being close at Northern State is going to help me allow me to do that.” Moni said. Moni averaged 21 points, 8 rebounds and three assists per game this past season in earning a first-team Northern Sun selection. Moni was highly sought after when entering the portal. He took visits to Wyoming, Drake and Illinois State, but chose to return home and play for Dave Richman’s team. “We are thrilled to welcome Jackson back home,” Richman said. “The addition of his size, skill, experience and character will blend terrifically with our current roster. Jackson’s drive to continue to develop and be a champion exemplify the qualities we want in our Bison Family.” Moni’s size and ability to shoot the three-point

shot made him a highly attractive transfer. He shot 33% from three-point range this past season, which at 6-10 is impressive. NDSU returns its top three three-point shooters from last year in Jacari White, Tajavis Miller and Noah Feddesen. Feddersen, who is also 6-foot-10, shot 39% on three’s making 21 of 54 attempts. Moni returns to Fargo after a stellar career at West Fargo Sheyenne, playing for head coach Tom Kirchoffner. He averaged 12 points and 7 rebounds a game during his high school career for the Mustangs, he was a Mister Basketball finalist in his senior season in 2021. Moni and Sheyenne lost in the state semifinals that year to West Fargo. “Just being able to play

in my hometown and playing in front of my friends and my family. I think that’ll be a great experience for me. Obviously, it’s going to be an adjustment going from Division Two to Division One. It’ll be growing pains, but just having the mentality to keep working and keep improving every day.” He reached the 1,000 point mark during his junior season with the Wolves, along with being named the Division II player of the week during mid-February. Moni finishes his Northern State career with 1,527 points and 559 rebounds. He said his time in Aberdeen has enhanced his game in nearly aspect. “I’ve been able to shoot the basketball pretty well, so I’m bringing that to NDSU. And just being

experienced, I know I want to talk Coach Richman he wanted guys that are experienced playing basketball. I’ve got one year left, I’ve got three years of college basketball under my belt. So I think that I can help add that to the Bison family.” Moni is the second transfer to join the NDSU men’s basketball roster for next season. Last week, VMI transfer point guard Brennan Watkins announced he was transferring to the Bison. He’ll have two years of eligibility remaining. NDSU saw five players leave through the portal after the season ended. Andrew Morgan transferred to Nebraska, Boden Skunberg to Illinois State, Josh Streit and Lance Waddles to Omaha and Sam Hastreiter to MSU Moorhead.

in the early 1980s. Next stop: the Bison Athletic Hall of Fame. When she joined the Bison team in 2009, NDSU was in the early stages of a Division I program. Behind then Amy Anderson, it became immediately competitive. “She meshed well with her teammates and motivated them to improve,” said NDSU head coach Matt Johnson. “Her presence on the team also helped recruiting because other prospects saw that she was able to have great success playing at NDSU. Her success both in college and on the LPGA Tour continues to have a positive influence on our players to this day.” The announcement doesn’t mean she’ll never play in an LPGA event. Because she was considered a Class A player for four straight years, Olson has limited status for the rest of her career with the LPGA, meaning she can go play an event or two. “If I go play a tournament, it’s for fun,” she said. “Professional golf and doing it as a career is

done. It wouldn’t be unheard of for me to go play but as Grant and I go on to the next phase in life, it’s going to push golf even more to the side.” She’s planning on playing in a qualifier for the U.S. Women’s Open on May 6 at Woodhill Country Club in Wayzata, Minnesota. She took that route last July to make the Open at Pebble Beach, a tournament she played in while seven months pregnant. “Truthfully, I’ve been telling everyone I hope I don’t qualify because that would mean I have to keep practicing,” she joked. “I don’t want it to be like I’m done with golf, now I hate the game. I actually want to love the game now more than I ever did.” The game had its frustrations. She finished in a tie for second in the 2020 U.S. Women’s Open. Earlier that year she finished second in the Australian Open. In 2018, she double bogeyed the final hole and finished in a tie second with three other players in The Evian Championship, just one shot out of first. She finishes with \$2.7 million in career earnings and 13 top-10 finishes. Her most consistent year was

2019 when she made 18 of 25 cuts. “I had goals, I had dreams that kept me motivated,” Olson said. “I didn’t reach all of them, which no one ever does and you have to be realistic about that. There was a part of me where, oh, that’s not going to be part of my story and that’s what kept me motivated going to the golf course every single day practicing. So it’s hard to let go of those sometimes.” Let go of a life that Hanson, a Fargo Central graduate and World Golf Hall of Fame inductee, chased in winning 17 LPGA tournaments. Hanson and Olson are the only area players to reach full-time tour status. For Olson, there were downsides to professional golf. The immense travel and the commitment to practice are often not done in front of cameras. “Trust me, I loved it in a lot of ways but there were a lot of days I did not love it,” Olson said. “That’s what you do when you have a goal, you sacrifice, you do the things you don’t like ... but I was getting to the point in life where I wanted other

# Armstrong, Miller debate in ND governor race

FARGO — Two Republican candidates have tried to set themselves apart from each other in the first debate for the North Dakota governor’s race, with one saying he is an experienced lawmaker and the other claiming North Dakotans want a business leader.

Lt. Gov. Tammy Miller and U.S. Rep. Kelly Armstrong went head-to-head Tuesday, April 23, in a one-hour Prairie Public live broadcast. The two are vying for a post held by Gov. Doug Burgum. The head of North Dakota said he would not seek a third term, leaving Burgum’s seat open at the end of the year. Armstrong and Miller will face off in the June 11 primary.

The winner in that race will go to the November general election, along with Democratic governor nominee Merrill Piepkorn and independent candidate Michael Coachman.

The first few minutes set a contentious tone for the night. In opening statements, Miller said North Dakotans have a choice for governor.

“Do you want your next governor to be an outsider and business leader or a career politician?” she asked. “Our state has succeeded with governors who have extensive private industry experience, and our country was so much better off with Donald Trump as our president, the ultimate outsider and business leader.”

Both candidates have promoted their support for Trump.

Miller has made her 14 years as Border States CEO a focal point of her gubernatorial campaign. Burgum appointed her chief operating officer for his office in April 2020 before making her his lieutenant governor in January 2023.

Armstrong bolstered his experience as a North

Dakota legislator from 2012 through 2018, when he was elected to the U.S. House.

“I’ve been in the arena,” he said.

He later called out Miller for using the term “career politician,” noting she has been in the governor’s office the same amount of time he has been in the U.S. House. Armstrong said he has relationships with the state Legislature and knows how to work with them.

“North Dakota wasn’t built by corporate America, and you don’t have to be a large CEO to be governor here,” he said in closing statements. “It’s not actually who we really are.”

A governor is the leader, or CEO, of the executive branch, Miller said. She said she has a good understanding of state issues and knows how to bring people together.

“I will be making every decision for the citizens of North Dakota,” she said.

“I think the problem with that is, the Legislature doesn’t work for you ... and your constituents don’t work for you,”

Armstrong said. “This is a relationship business.”

Miller said it was insulting to suggest CEOs can’t have relationships.

“Managing a multibillion-dollar company, growing it from \$485 million to over \$2.5 billion doesn’t happen without good relationships,” she said. “I know how to build relationships, I know how to capitalize on those relationships, and I know how to get things done. I have a proven track record of results.”

## Some agreements, some debate

The two agreed on several topics, including affordable access to medical services for senior citizens, promoting the oil and gas industry, protecting Second Amendment rights, and a near-total ban on abortion.

Both agreed that red flag laws, which allow courts to temporarily take guns away from people who are found to be a danger to themselves or others, are unconstitutional.

“I’ve never seen one that protects due process rights,” Armstrong said.

“This is one thing that I

completely agree on with my opponent,” Miller said. “Red flag laws are not the solution to gun violence.”

Even on issues where they debated more intensely, they leaned toward conservative beliefs.

For example, the two agreed that the North Dakota Legislature did not go too far when it passed laws last year that prohibit transgender girls and women from joining female sports and a ban on gender-affirming care.

“I think we won the culture wars during the last legislative session,” Miller said.

“Boys should not play girls sports,” Armstrong said. “That is just a fact. That is reality.”

When it came to banning LGBTQ books that discuss sex, Armstrong said he wants local school boards making those decisions, while Miller said the state needs consistent policy across the state.

“Who wants their child to see pornography in the library?” she asked.

The Legacy Fund was also put on the table. The fund, which comes from

oil and natural gas tax revenues, has seen more than \$8 billion in deposits since it was established by voters in 2010.

Armstrong called for more transparency in where the funds are invested, noting \$800 million is invested in 23 banks in 12 countries that have signed the net-zero pledge.

“We are investing taxpayer money in North Dakota’s own demise,” he said.

Residents shouldn’t have to file an open records request to know where their tax dollars are invested, Armstrong said.

“Government is at its worst when it is paternal,” he said. “When government says, if you just knew what I knew, you would do what I do.”

Miller fired back, saying the state has a website showing financial statements and holds open meetings. Legacy dollars are invested in great funds and infrastructure, she said.

“I think we have good transparency in the Legacy Fund,” she said.

### Raising capital

Just over half of the capital campaign goal has been raised, including \$20 million raised in the past 12 months, Miskavige said. “We want to raise \$20 million this year.”

“We’re also looking for our naming donor,” she said.

Donations have and are expected to come throughout the region and beyond, Miskavige said, “from anyone with a connection to this area or who are interested in advancing preschool-12 education. Anyone who loves lifelong learning.”

“We need the whole community to get involved,” she added.

The North Dakota Legislature has provided two \$100,000 planning grants for the project – one from the Department of Commerce and the other from North Dakota Tourism – and \$5 million in the 2023 legislative session, Miskavige said.

Grand Forks City Council has committed \$10 million over a period of years, a time frame that is still being determined, she said.

The \$50,000 grant,

presented Tuesday, is from the FHLB Des Moines Member Impact Fund, which provides \$3 for every \$1 of an eligible FHLB Des Moines member’s grant donation, according to a news release from Alerus Financial. The grant is intended to strengthen the ability of nonprofits or government entities to serve the affordable housing or community development needs of their communities.

The Member Impact Fund matching program is available to member institutions, such as Alerus Financial, which apply for the funds. Funds are distributed directly to the member institution, which then provides the funding alongside a matching grant from FHLB Des Moines for the partner or recipient organization.

### Commitment to the region

Katie Mayer, executive director of the Grand Forks Children’s Museum, said, “We are extremely thankful to Alerus and Federal Home Loan Bank of Des Moines for their support. This generous gift demonstrates their commitment to investing in our region

and the future generations of our community.”

About the progress of the capital campaign, she said, “We have a lot of work to do, but we believe we can do it.”

Mayer is serving part-time as executive director of the Grand Forks Children’s Museum until her role as principal of Holy Family-St. Mary’s School ends June 30. She will work full-time for the

museum beginning July 1, she said.

“It’s a great project, and so many people want to get involved,” Mayer said.

Wolf said the team involved in building momentum and support for the Children’s Museum “has done a tremendous job getting to this point.”

“I sure appreciate what you guys are doing,” Wolf

told the several museum board members who gathered at Alerus Financial on Tuesday. “The ball is rolling.”

The Children’s Museum “will provide year-round amenities for families and educational opportunities for children from throughout the region, making it a great fit for our community development focus,” he said in a news release.

time, and it needs to be fixed,” Fedorchak said. She continued by saying that securing energy and the national grid is a key part of national security, as well.

“Maintaining a reliable grid to service us and serve our needs is

absolutely vital to our security in our communities and our homes,” Fedorchak said. “Energy security is a key piece of national security and I will be a very strong leader in that regard in Congress.”

Fedorchak also supports a national “floor” on abortion where the procedure would be illegal after 12 to 22 weeks of

pregnancy with exceptions for the health of the mother. She also would want states to have the ability to go more restrictive if a state so chooses.

“I think our biggest challenge as a pro-life leader is to get the focus back on promoting a culture of life and supporting moms and families,” Fedorchak said. “I don’t know very many people

that think abortion is a good thing, so let’s work together to reduce abortion and reduce the occurrence of unwanted pregnancies and to support women and men in choosing life.”

Abortion has been illegal in North Dakota since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade in 2022. The North Dakota’s sole clinic – formerly

in Fargo – moved to Moorhead, Minnesota, where abortion is protected under the state’s constitution and in state law.

Fedorchak said she has also heard from many people that they are frustrated with the “woke” agenda.

“We know in North Dakota that boys shouldn’t be playing girls’ sports, we know that cops

are the good guys, they aren’t the bad guys,” Fedorchak said. “The government needs to get out of the way of parents and let parents parent. Nobody had a better interest in their children than the parents.”

written responses to questions for GFEA members' consideration.

Flynn said she wanted to continue the work she started during her first two terms on the School Board, including the board's recent turn to focusing more closely on the experience inside schools.

"The focus of the board should be learning about academics and what the students are going through," Flynn said.

Of the three candidates, she dealt most in concrete examples from her time on the board, pointing to both success like last year's teacher salary bump and paternal leave as well as the board's failure to do a better job connecting with community members and "telling (the district's) story" to community members and legislators.

In his opening remarks, Kleven, an engineer with AE2S Engineering, said he wanted to champion the value public schools brought to the community in light of increasing skepticism toward public education and legislative pushes for options like school choice.

He was candid about his status as a political neophyte, though he noted he could help facilitate intergovernmental dialogue through his professional contacts, and said he would focus on improving student and teacher well-being as well

as facilitating open communication.

"Being standoffish doesn't work in North Dakota," he said. "And the best way to not be standoffish is to talk to people."

Murphy, a businessman who ran for School Board in 2022, said he would "bring more of a data-driven approach" to the school district and push for policies like merit-based pay for teachers based on students' academic improvement – he later extended that to administrators as well – and for greater administrative support for discipline.

He said today's students suffered from a culture of narcissism and described kids as "dumb" and in need of direction.

"We want to instill values where we want to live for others," he said.

He later clarified to the Herald, saying by "dumb" he meant "inexperienced."

"The argument I made was that because kids are, well, kids, they need to be directed by adults and not running the show, as has been the case far too often in the classroom," he wrote in an email.

In their written responses, Manley wrote about increasing the district's general fund reserves to 15% of operating expenses and improving teachers' experience in the district.

Lunn emphasized the importance of retaining teachers and better

communication with community stakeholders, citing the controversy over proposed cuts to music and foreign language teachers' full-time equivalency.

"Once there was complete information, the logical decision was easier to see," Lunn wrote.

Both said they would like to see School Board tours of district schools return, which Flynn also alluded to at the GFEA forum.

In the forum, Flynn and Kleven both spoke about the need to improve student and teacher well-being and mental health, with Kleven speaking about improving teachers' work environment

through "non-monetary benefits" like greater schedule flexibility and Flynn pushing for improved mental health resources.

She notably disclosed she disagreed with administrators' decision to cut the district's licensed addiction counselor, one of the only such positions in North Dakota, in next year's budget.

"Unfortunately, sometimes when you're cutting into meat, it goes into bone, and we're going to feel the effects of that," she said, adding she expected administrators to reverse course on that decision in the future. (Flynn told the

Herald later that staff cuts were still ultimately up to administrators, as she has said previously.)

Toward the end of the session, one GFEA member asked the board about bridging the gap between district leadership and teachers, particularly given a School Board policy that is viewed as an effective gag order for teachers to address the board on district policy.

Kleven conceded he lacked the board experience to speak about the issue but that he would keep an open door if elected.

Murphy appeared to suggest teachers should simply ignore the policy.

"If it's a policy position

that you want to, come to public (comment) and voice your opinion," he said. "If its personnel, go through the proper channels, but don't feel like there's a culture of fear and intimidation, right? ... If you feel like that's the case, we've got a much deeper problem."

Flynn also indicated she was open to changing that policy.

"There's a gap there that's been identified and we need to figure it out and stop saying 'there's a policy in the way,'" Flynn said. "We're a policy-making board, we can figure it out."

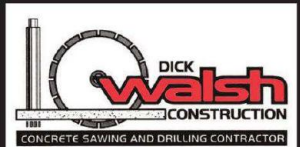

# WHY THE VIKINGS ARE THE MOST DESIRABLE TEAM FOR A ROOKIE QB

The decision will define the tenures of general manager Adofo-Mensah and coach O’Connell

The question has defined the past couple of months for the Vikings: Will they trade up to draft a quarterback?

The answer will finally come on Thursday night when the Vikings are on the clock in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft.

Whether it ends up being LSU quarterback Jayden Daniels, UNC quarterback Drake Maye, Michigan quarterback J.J. McCarthy, Washington quarterback Michael Penix, or Oregon quarterback Bo Nix remains to be seen. The only thing that feels certain at this point is that the Vikings will be leaving the first round with a new quarterback.

The decision ultimately will define the tenures of general manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah and head coach Kevin O’Connell. If they get it right, they will be royalty in Minnesota. If they get it wrong, they will be run out of town sooner rather than later.

The magnitude of the task at hand isn’t lost on either of them. They have been preparing for this moment since they joined forces in the name of collaboration. They are ready to live with the results.

“Just because

something is risky doesn’t mean we’re scared of it,” Adofo-Mensah said. “We’ve got to take our swing.”

The risk involved doesn’t give the Vikings any sort of pause, nor should it, especially considering the pieces they already have in place. Frankly, there isn’t a more desirable landing spot for a rookie quarterback. Not with all the offensive weapons the Vikings have at their disposal.

“The path is not the same for every player,” O’Connell said. “We just happen to have a really good situation.”

Everything a rookie quarterback needs to succeed seems to be in place at TCO Performance Center, even if he ends up watching from the sidelines this season with journeyman quarterback Sam Darnold under center.

Not only do the Vikings have a pair of dynamic playmakers in star receiver Justin Jefferson and young receiver Jordan Addison, a security blanket in star tight end T.J. Hockenson, and a workhorse in veteran running back Aaron Jones, they have an offensive mastermind in O’Connell running the show.

“If we gave truth serum to the quarterbacks and the agents of all the top guys, every

single one of them would say they would love nothing more than to go to the Vikings,” NFL Network analyst Daniel Jeremiah said. “That would be the No. 1 choice. That is by far the best landing spot for a quarterback to go into. It’s all set up.”

It’s a perfect example of how the concept of “Nature vs. Nurture” can go a long way in determining success.

The pre-draft process is rooted in determining how good a particular player can be based on his talent alone. It does not take into account the situation a particular player is walking into. Sometimes that can make all the difference in development.

“That’s the interesting part,” Adofo-Mensah said. “You go back and look at some of these historical things and everybody talks about the low hit rates. Is that because the player wasn’t good, or because the situation wasn’t great? I’m not saying I know the answer to that.”

The infrastructure the Vikings have built should be able to support whichever rookie quarterback they decide to take. The same thing can’t be said about, say, the Washington Commanders, who own the No. 2 pick, or the New England Patriots, who own the No. 3 pick.

“It’s not just getting the

quarterback right,” Adofo-Mensah said. “It’s getting the quarterback right and the team around it.”

Should that deter the Commanders from taking Daniels or the Patriots from taking Maye? It depends on who’s being asked the question.

“I’m a fan of taking the quarterback and figuring out the rest at a later date,” ESPN analyst Field Yates said. “It’s such a tricky line to be toeing when a team is expecting to have the chance to draft a quarterback.”

That’s precisely why the Vikings should be

aggressive in their pursuit of a quarterback in the 2024 NFL Draft. There’s no guarantee they are going to be in a better position to make a splash in the coming years. They have never drafted a quarterback in the Top 10, and this might be their best opportunity to do so.

“We’re not the only team that may want to select one of these guys,” O’Connell said. “We’re working through making sure we know the landscape of the whole class at that position, as we are many, many positions throughout the draft that

we think we can help our team win.”

# Mock Draft: QBs go 1-2-3 after Vikings trade up

Bears nab USC’s Williams in what could be a top-heavy offensive draft in the first round Thursday

This will be the first NFL Draft held in the Motor City.

Fittingly, the first few teams will be looking for offensive engines.

Quarterbacks were selected No. 1 overall in seven of the last 10 drafts, and that figures to be the case again Thursday with the Chicago Bears likely to take former USC stand-out Caleb Williams.

And as was the case in 2021, quarterbacks could go 1-2-3.

This mock draft contemplates a trade near the top, with conjecture that the New England Patriots could swap the No. 3 pick for Minnesota’s two first-round selections at 11 and 23. Both teams are in the market for quarterbacks, so it’s perfectly reasonable that the Patriots might stay put.

Regardless, there is intrigue at the top of this year’s draft.

There’s also legacy. This field of prospects features several whose fathers played in the NFL, among them Marvin Harrison Jr. and Frank Gore Jr., Kris Jenkins, who likewise shares his father’s name, along with Brenden Rice (son of Jerry Rice), Joe Alt (John Alt), Luke McCaffrey (Ed McCaffrey) and Jonah Elliss (Luther Elliss).

Harrison is likely to be a top-five pick and the first non-quarterback off the board.

One way the first round could unfold:

**1. CHICAGO: QB Caleb Williams, USC** — The Bears are taking a quarterback. Barring a surprise, they’re taking this Trojans star.

**10. N.Y. JETS: T Taliese Fuaga, Oregon State** — Receiver is tempting here, but a reliable tackle probably would be even more helpful for the aging Aaron Rodgers.

**11. NEW ENGLAND (proposed trade from Minnesota): DT Byron Murphy II, Texas** — If the Patriots bail out of the No. 3 pick, they might decide to wait a bit on a QB.

**12. DENVER: WR Rome Odunze, Washington** — Jerry Jeudy is gone and Courtland Sutton might not be around much longer. Time to restock at Receiver.

**22. PHILADELPHIA: OT Tyler Guyton, Oklahoma** — Eagles select the eventual replacement for five-time Pro Bowler Lane Johnson, who has been a rock at right tackle but is 33.

**23. NEW ENGLAND (proposed trade from Minnesota): CB Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama** — Foot injury might give teams a little trepidation, but McKinstry has the tools to be a shutdown corner in the NFL.

**24. DALLAS: T Amarius Mims, Georgia** — The Cowboys need a center, too, but Mims will be the left tackle of the

future for somebody. Why not Dallas?

**25. GREEN BAY: T Jordan Morgan, Arizona** — Packers have released David Bakhtiari, and they need to address their offensive line. A good place to start.

**26. TAMPA BAY: C Jackson Powers-Johnson, Oregon** — GM Jason Licht likes drafting offensive linemen, and the Buccaneers need to find a solid center once and for all.

# Wolves’ dedication to identity is showing in NBA playoffs

After Minnesota shredded the Phoenix Suns in Game 2 of their first-round NBA playoff series on Tuesday, Suns players and coach Frank Vogel made comments that would sound alarms for any willing ear.

They were no surprise for anyone who had watched the game because the Suns’ collective composure visibly unraveled in the second half. As the turnovers and missed defensive assignments piled up, players were bickering with officials and throwing their arms up in conspicuous exasperation.

“My frustration is just within the team. We need to execute,” Phoenix guard Devin Booker said. “We play well when we’re playing, and then we need to stick together once things turn bad. We’ve done that throughout the season. (It’s) something that has to be corrected.”

It feels a little late for that. As then-Timberwolves guard D’Angelo Russell said during the Timberwolves’ first-round series loss to Memphis in 2022: “We’re in the playoffs now. Nobody is going to change. You pretty much are who you are.”

The Timberwolves hold a 2-0 lead on the Suns in their best-of-seven series that resumes Friday night in Phoenix. Tip off is set for 9:30 p.m. Central Time.

Epiphanies generally aren’t made in the post-season; that’s what an 82-game regular season is for. The postseason tends to reveal who you are — which isn’t exactly a mystery to those who have followed your journey for

the previous seven months leading up to this point. In the regular season, you establish an identity the team can lean on when times get tough in the playoffs.

For instance, it was no surprise when rebounding and late-game offense sank Minnesota against Memphis in 2022. A year ago, Minnesota was essentially a shape-shifter, changing identity depending on who was available on a nightly basis. The Wolves flexed that muscle against Denver as bodies continued to drop but ultimately were unable to do anything more than test the eventual NBA champion.

You can’t win a title if you don’t really know who you are as a team, and with a bevy of roster changes a year ago — highlighted by the major offseason acquisition of Rudy Gobert — it seemed to take Minnesota a full season to figure out which direction it would consistently lean.

The Wolves needed something to hang their hat on, and they knew it.

“When we sat down in training camp and said, ‘What team do we want to be?’ We said we wanted to be a defensive-minded team and be the best in the league,” Gobert said. “We can be unique, but it comes with a price. It comes with doing the dirty work, it comes with doing the things you don’t see on the stats sheet and doing it consistently. I really felt like from Day 1 of training camp, everyone really bought in to be that team.”

That’s never really wavered. Minnesota — which won 56 regular-season games this season, second-most in franchise

history — was the No. 1 defense in the NBA by a comfortable margin. Now in the playoffs, that defense is winning the team games with relative ease. When the offense struggles, the defense keeps the ship afloat. It’s why Phoenix has never felt in control for any stretch of either of the first two games.

The Wolves are playing their game. They are who they want to be.

“We’ve been a defensive team all season,” Timberwolves coach Chris Finch said.

And Phoenix has been an inconsistent team all season, with a series of stops, starts and spurts of good play but no consistency. That’s been on full display over the past three weeks, with the Suns shelling Minnesota twice in the regular season only to look powerless in the first two matchups of this series.

When times get tough, as they are right now for the Suns, what can they rely upon? Devin Booker is the only member of Phoenix’s current rotation who was even on the team 15 months ago.

In many ways, Phoenix is in a similar spot Minnesota was this time a year ago, searching for solutions that aren’t quite yet apparent.

“We’re all trying to fight out there, and so far this series, once it has turned to (bad), we’ve kind of separated instead of being together, and that’s everybody — top to bottom,” Booker said. “We’ve got to figure it out.”

In the NBA, the playoffs are the test, and there is no cheat sheet allowed. By now, you either know the answers or you don’t.

# Edwards’ Game 2 wasn’t very loud, but it helped surging Timberwolves

## He finished with eight assists to just one turnover

Anthony Edwards thrust himself back into the forefront of the national conversation on Saturday when he poured in 33 points to go with nine assists and six boards in a Game 1 victory over the Phoenix Suns in the first round of the playoffs. He also jawed with Kevin Durant as he made his way down the floor after splashing a triple in the future Hall of Famer’s face.

For the ensuing two days, ESPN and TNT conversations largely centered on the 22-year-old guard and his ascending stardom.

Tuesday’s performance was comparatively understated.

He did knock down a couple of key shots — a step-back again over Durant in the third that was a part of Minnesota’s separation-inducing run, and a triple in transition that effectively served as the kill shot in the fourth.

But for the most part, Edwards didn’t shoot well, going just 3 for 12 from the field. If asked about Timberwolves who were key to their victory Tuesday in Game 2, he wouldn’t be at the top of players you’d mention off the top of your head. Performances by Jaden McDaniels, Mike Conley, Rudy Gobert and Nickeil Alexander-Walker were more conspicuously effective.

But their contributions, particularly offensively, were all keyed by Edwards’ mere presence. Phoenix simply doesn’t have a wing defender capable of staying in front of the guard. So the Suns are forced to commit numerous resources to slow Edwards down.

In the past, such a stacked defense would have led to a number of turnovers and ill-advised shot attempts from Edwards, who doesn’t like to be denied his offensive aggressiveness by the opponent.

“I want to score,” Edwards noted after Game 1. “But (the excessive gap help defense) definitely takes away my scoring ability. They do a great job doing it, man. ... (Suns coach) Frank Vogel is great at taking somebody out of the game.”

But Edwards ensured Tuesday that those plays came at a cost. He’s repeatedly stretching out Phoenix’s defense,

drawing two defenders before passing to an open man. As a result, Conley, McDaniels and others are catching the ball in advantageous positions that either lead to open jumpers or easy drives to the rim against hard-charging closeout defenders.

Edwards finished with eight assists Tuesday to just one turnover, and that’s on top of the plays where his decision-making led to a series of other passes that created a scoring chance.

“Ant kept making the right play. They kept doubling. He didn’t shoot the ball well, but I still thought he did the right thing to unlock a lot of great shots (for others),” Wolves coach Chris Finch said. “We didn’t make those shots. At halftime I said, ‘Don’t worry, those shots are going to go in. Just keep taking ’em. Keep making ’em. Keep creating.’ ”

Sure enough, the seal eventually broke — vindication for Minnesota’s coaching staff, which has worked with Edwards for multiple years to allow his gravitational pull to create opportunities for others. That message started to sink in with the guard over the latter half of the season.

“It’s been great growth for him. I thought he actually had some good looks when he had them. So, it wasn’t like he didn’t get any quality looks. It just didn’t go in for him,” Finch said. “But I still liked the way he kept making the right play. We’ve been preaching that. He believes in his

teammates, and that’s the most important thing.”

## Injury updates

Suns guard Grayson Allen re-injured the right ankle he originally hurt in Game 1 in the third quarter of Game 2 on Tuesday when his foot landed on the foot of Conley.

Allen crumpled to the floor and had to be helped back to Phoenix’s locker room. He did not return to action and was deemed day to day by the team.

“Forty-eight hours in between, two days,” Allen told reporters in Phoenix’s locker room after the game. “We’ll see how it goes after two days.”

Allen received around-the-clock treatment between Games 1 and 2 to be available on Tuesday. Phoenix outscored Minnesota by three points in the guard’s 17 minutes on Tuesday, and fell apart after he left the contest.

Even the threat of Allen’s shooting is necessary to create some semblance of spacing for Phoenix’s other perimeter scorers to operate. Allen was the best 3-point shooter in the NBA this season — 46 percent on six attempts per game. As a team, Phoenix is just 17 for 50 from beyond the arc this series, woeful numbers in terms of both volume and percentage.

Kyle Anderson, who suffered a hip pointer in Game 1, was available for Game 2 against Phoenix but did not see the floor. Finch said the Wolves will see how Anderson feels ahead of Friday’s Game 3.

# Timberwolves’ Naz Reid named NBA Sixth Man of the Year

## Reid is now the third undrafted player to win the honor, joining Darrell Armstrong and John Starks

Naz Reid went undrafted in 2019 after his freshman season at LSU. He spent much of his first professional season in the G-League. He was out of Minnesota’s rotation as recently as the start of last season.

But every time a challenge hit, he pushed forward and adapted.

He got leaner and more athletic. He honed his jumper. He developed as a defender.

Ask him to play center, and he’ll do that. Small forward? He can do that, too. He may have to guard Anthony Davis on the interior one night and chase Grayson Allen around the perimeter on the next. He might play 30 minutes one night and 15 the next. But rest assured, whenever he is on the floor, he’ll give you

his best effort.

Whatever Minnesota has needed from the 24-year-old in his young career, Reid has provided. He’s everything a team could ask for in a sixth man, which made Wednesday’s announcement so fitting.

Reid was named the NBA’s 2023-24 Sixth Man of the Year. The honor was announced on TNT’s pregame show ahead of the evening playoff action. Reid averaged 13.5 points and 5.2 rebounds this season while shooting a blistering 41 percent from 3-point range.

He played in 81 games and was highly productive in 14 starts late in the season when he filled in for the injured Karl-Anthony Towns. Reid’s play down the stretch run of the season kept Minnesota alive in the race for the No. 1 seed in the Western Conference.

Reid is the third undrafted player to win the honor, joining Darrell Armstrong and John Starks. He edged Sacramento guard Malik Monk by 10 points — two first-place votes — for the award, making it the closest Sixth Man of the Year race since the current voting system was put into place for the 2002-03 season.

After the award was announced, Timberwolves fans and players alike raced to social media — all to say the same thing.

“Naz Reid.”

The franchise’s cult hero is now an award winner.

Coach Chris Finch said the team “couldn’t be more proud” of Reid.

“His contributions to our team this year were a key reason for our team’s success,” Finch said. “His growth this season and

# Twins take third straight from lowly White Sox

## The Twins go for a sweep of the four-game series on Thursday afternoon

Joe Ryan picked up his first win of the season for the Twins on Wednesday night at Target Field, and he did it with flair. Making his fifth start of the season, the 27-year-old right-hander struck out eight over six innings as the Twins beat the Chicago White Sox 6-3 before an announced crowd of 12,546. The Twins go for a sweep of the four-game series on Thursday afternoon before beginning a three-game series against the Los Angeles Angels in Anaheim, Calif., on Friday. Ryan (1-1) recorded a career-high 12 strikeouts on April 13, a no-decision against Detroit, when he allowed three runs in six

innings of work. He entered Wednesday's game with a strikeout rate of 11.91 per nine innings, second in the American League to his opponent on the mound, the White Sox's Garrett Crochet. The Twins set a season high with 13 hits. Ryan was staked to a 4-0 lead in the second inning. After Christian Vazquez brought in a run on an RBI single to right, Willi Castro lined a three-run home run into the left-field stands. It was Castro's second home run of the season, and it came on his 27th birthday. Ryan retired the first six batters he faced, including the first three on strikeouts, before Kevin Pillar led off the third inning with a home

run to left. One out later, White Sox catcher Corey Lee homered into the second deck in left to cut the Twins' lead to 4-2. The White Sox stole a run in the fifth inning to cut the Twins' lead to 4-3.

Braden Shewmake reached on a one-out bunt single and moved to second on a walk to Lee. Ryan then had Shewmake picked off second, but his throw to third was late. Shewmake was then

credited with a steal of home when Vazquez was unable to throw out Lee on a steal of second. The Twins added to their two-run lead in the bottom of the fifth. Manny Margot led off the

inning with a double, and two outs later, pinch-hitter Max Kepler drove him in on a bloop single to left. Kepler moved to third on a single by Vazquez — his third hit of the game — and scored on a wild pitch. Matt Bowman, Brock Stewart and Griffin Jax each followed Ryan with a shutout inning. A series sweep would be a first for the Twins this season. They have been swept twice. Bailey Ober (1-1, 4.91 earned-run average) will pitch for the Twins against Michael Soroka (0-3, 7.50 ERA). The White Sox (3-21), already guaranteed to lose their seventh series of the season, have lost six in a row and 10 of their last 11.

# Twins' Jeffers gets his shot at top of batting order

Twins manager Rocco Baldelli raised some eyebrows when he penciled in Alex Kirilloff as the team's leadoff hitter the first two games of the series. Wednesday it was 6-foot-4, 235-pound catcher Ryan Jeffers getting the nod and serving as the Twins' designated hitter. It was the first time in Jeffers' five-year career, which spans 294 games, that he hit at the top of the order. "He's finally realizing how fast I am around the bases," Jeffers said with a smile. In reality, Baldelli said the idea was to get his best two right-handed hitters, Jeffers and Byron Buxton, as many at-bats

as possible against Chicago White Sox left-handed starter Garrett Crochet. "I have no concern with changing our lineup every day based on who is playing," Baldelli said. "The way that we are functioning now, the way our roster works, we don't have anywhere near the ability to put a set lineup out there. "We're mixing and matching every day based on who is available and based on how we match up against the opposing pitcher." Jeffers said he wasn't shocked when he saw the lineup card. "Facing a lefty, I wasn't too surprised I would be up towards the top," he said. "Rocco prefaced earlier in the year that there would be chances I would be leading off someday.

"I've been hitting second for a couple weeks now, and for me it's wherever my name is in there I'm going to go out there and treat it the same if I was hitting sixth, seventh or wherever. I've had success with my approach, so I'm going to try not to change anything." Injuries have forced Baldelli's hand when it comes to being creative with his lineup. "When your everyday players are not out there and you're deciding who is actually going to be playing, it takes time," he said. "And then you piece together an order that goes with it. It's a lot easier when I can sit in here by myself and sketch the lineup out on a piece of paper. "That's the way it feels like it should be for most

of the year, but it hasn't been like that for us from opening day until now." Needed production Buxton, who hit a game-tying home run in the ninth inning of Tuesday's win, is heating up after a slow start to the season. He entered Wednesday's game 7 for 16 on the homestand, including three doubles and a home run, and three runs batted in. "I think he's just gaining his timing over the course of the early season," Baldelli said, "and I think that can be the case for almost any hitter. I think he's just seeing the ball better. "And I think he's getting into his lower half a little better, which is letting him get some of these pitches. And he's

hitting the ball hard." Duran back on mound Twins reliever Jhoan Duran, who made his first rehab appearance with the Saints on Tuesday, met briefly with reporters in the Twins' clubhouse before Wednesday's game. Duran has yet to pitch for the Twins this season as he recovers from a right oblique strain. Duran pitched one inning for the Saints, allowing two runs on four hits, and acknowledged that his velocity was down. Duran said he was mostly focused on throwing all of his pitches, and not necessarily the results. He expects to pitch for the Saints again on Friday, with a decision to be

made after that on whether he should be activated. "He doesn't have a hard timeline," Baldelli said. "At this point we want to get him feeling good. When he threw his live (batting practice) here his stuff was basically normal. I don't think anything has changed between then and now. "He's probably just getting settled back in on the mound. He also threw a lot of pitches (27), more than you would think most rehab (appearances) would be. But it's good for him to get out there and put a little stress on his body, because when he comes back we want him to be ready." # Tyler Herro, Heat shoot down Celtics in Game 2

Tyler Herro sank six of Miami’s franchise-playoff-record 23 3-pointers as the Heat evened their Eastern Conference first-round playoff series with the Boston Celtics by earning a 111-101 road victory in Game 2 on Wednesday night.

Miami shot 23 of 43 from long distance, with Herro going 6 of 11 on 3-point tries en route to a team-high 24 points. Herro also had 14 assists.

“Everybody came to play,” Herro said. “We lost bad in Game 1 and everybody responded. That’s all you can ask for from a group of guys. ... We love to compete and that’s what it’s all about.”

Eighth-seeded Miami led 102-91 after Bam Adebayo made a hook shot with 4:12 to play, and top-seeded Boston failed to get closer than six points after that. The Heat outscored the Celtics 53-40 in the second half.

Adebayo collected 21 points and 10 rebounds. Miami also received 21 points from Caleb Martin, who made 5 of 6 shots from 3-point range.

“We understood how many missed opportunities we had hesitating to shoot the threes in Game 1, and we had the mentality coming in of just let it fly,” Martin said. “We were hungry. The only way you beat a team like that is come in and try to play on the same level.”

Boston’s Jaylen Brown led all scorers with 33 points, and Jayson Tatum finished with 28 points. Brown and Tatum each had eight rebounds.

The Celtics were limited to 12 3-point field goals (on 32 attempts) after they went 22 of 49 from distance during their 114-94 victory in Game 1.

“Two completely different games from Game 1 to Game 2 based on the schemes, so we have to adjust to that,” Boston coach Joe Mazzulla said. “More switching on their part. Higher pick-up points, and obviously their adjustment to shoot more. We’re going to have

to find a balance, because a lot of those guys who made shots are also good drivers, especially getting downhill.

“When you play a little bit inefficient offense from the standpoint of fighting for your space and getting there, it puts a ton of pressure on your defense, and that’s the kind of team that takes advantage of inefficient offense because of their ability to attack at that other end.”

Miami’s Jaime Jaquez Jr. added 14 points while Nikola Jovic finished with 11 points, nine rebounds and six assists.

Boston’s Kristaps Porzingis shot 1 of 9 from the field and finished with six points.

Miami led 28-27 after one quarter but trailed 61-58 at halftime. The Heat made 13 3-pointers

(on 24 tries) in the first half.

The Heat had a five-point lead with 2:09 left in the half, but the Celtics closed the period on an 11-3 run. Brown scored all 11 Boston points in the sequence, during which he sank three consecutive treys. Neither team led by more than six points in the first two quarters.

A 15-3 run put the Heat up 82-70 with 3:36 remaining in the third quarter. Miami was on top 85-79 entering the fourth.

Game 3 will be played Saturday in Miami.

**Trophy Trust reinstates Bush as 2005 Heisman winner**

Due to an evolving landscape in college football, the Heisman Trust ran a reverse to reinstate 2005 winner Reggie Bush on Wednesday.

Bush was honored in a brief ceremony attended by college football dignitaries, who share his status as members of the Heisman club.

Tim Tebow, Earl Campbell, Eric Crouch, George Rogers, Steve Spurrier, Ricky Williams and Archie Griffin were among the 11 fellow Heisman winners in attendance.

Bush won the 2005 Heisman Trophy in his final season at Southern California, where he amassed 3,169 rushing yards, gained 1,301 receiving yards and returned kick-offs and punts for a combined 2,081 yards. He totaled 42 touchdowns and also threw a 52-yard touchdown pass.

The physical trophy was returned to Bush by the trust and a replica will be given to USC, which returned its facsimile of Bush’s award in 2010.

In 2005, Bush was named first-team All-American and the Associated Press College Football Player of the Year.

But he was stripped of his Heisman and his stats in 2010 after a four-year investigation by the NCAA showed that Bush and his family took improper financial benefits, including cash and

paid-for housing.

When name, image and likeness legislation was enacted in 2021, Bush asked the NCAA to reinstate his status. The Heisman Trust said at the time it would consider giving back his trophy if the NCAA agreed to reinstate him, but the organization declined.

In part due to a 2021 Supreme Court decision that questions the legality of the amateurism model, the Heisman Trust said it was forced to reconsider “reinstating” the 2005 award and welcoming Bush back to the annual award ceremony. Fellow Heisman winners, most recently former Texas A&M quarterback Johnny Manziel and Notre Dame wide receiver Tim Brown, said they would skip future ceremonies unless Bush got his trophy back.

Bush was named to the College Football Hall of Fame last year.

He received 784 first-place votes during the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting, the fifth-most in Heisman Trophy history.

**Lions wide receiver St. Brown gets \$120M extension**

The Detroit Lions have agreed to a four-year, \$120 million extension with All-Pro wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown, NFL Network reported Wednesday.

The deal runs through 2028 and reportedly includes \$77 million guaranteed, supplanting Cooper Kupp’s \$75 million as the highest total among

NFL wideouts.

With an average annual value of \$30 million per season, St. Brown would trail only Miami Dolphins star Tyreek Hill’s annual compensation of \$31.3 million, according to Spotrac.

A fourth-round pick in 2021, St. Brown had been scheduled to earn \$3.366 million in base salary in the final year of his rookie contract in 2024.

St. Brown, 24, caught 119 passes for 1,515 yards and 10 touchdowns in 16 starts in 2023, adding 22 receptions for 274 yards and one score in three postseason games.

The two-time Pro Bowl selection’s career totals include 315 catches for 3,588 yards and 21 TDs in 49 games (41 starts).

**Bengals defensive end Hendrickson requests trade**

Cincinnati Bengals Pro Bowl defensive end Trey Hendrickson requested a trade on Wednesday, according to reports from ESPN and NFL Network.

Hendrickson signed a one-year, \$21 million extension that included an \$8 million signing bonus last year, but now he is looking for a long-term contract outside of Cincinnati. However, the Bengals do not want to deal him to another team, per the reports.

In 17 games (all starts) last season, Hendrickson tied for second in the NFL with 17.5 sacks. He recorded 43 tackles and also forced three fumbles.

A Pro Bowler in each of the past three seasons,

Hendrickson, 29, has amassed 59.5 sacks, 174 tackles, 12 forced fumbles and 119 quarterback hits in 93 career games (64 starts) with the New Orleans Saints (2017-20) and Bengals (2021-23).

New Orleans selected Hendrickson in the third round (103rd overall) of the 2017 draft.

**Jones begins workouts, returning from pectoral surgery**

Jon Jones is back on the comeback trail and has an eye on resuming his career.

The heavyweight champion has been sidelined with a torn pectoral muscle that required surgery in October.

Jones worked out for the first time since his recovery period and was encouraged.

“First day back in the gym since my injury, felt amazing. And so it began,” Jones said on his Instagram account on Tuesday night.

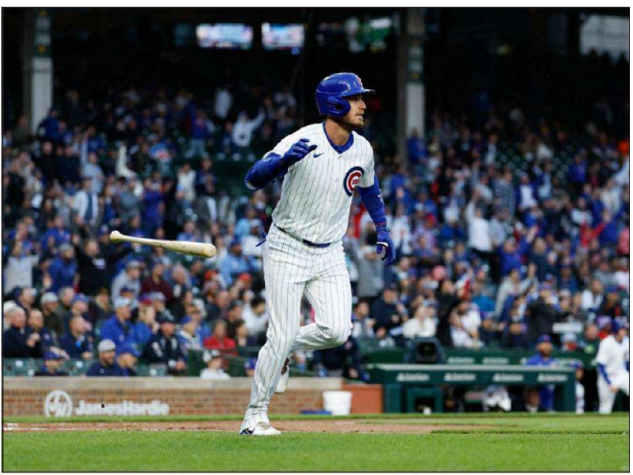
When Jones was hurt, he was scheduled to defend his title against Stipe Miocic. He withdrew from that bout as part of UFC 295.

Jones, 36, might be able to return this summer or early fall.

Jones is 27-1 plus one no-contest in 29 bouts.

**Cubs outfielder Bellinger (fractured rib) lands on IL**

The Chicago Cubs placed two-time All-Star Cody Bellinger on the 10-day injured list Wednesday with a fractured right rib.

The Cubs called up their top prospect, Pete Crow-Armstrong, in a corresponding move. Cubs manager Craig Counsell announced the moves in a radio interview.

Bellinger was injured during Tuesday night’s win over the Houston Astros after running into the center field wall chasing down a ball. He left after the fifth inning with what the team called bruised ribs. Bellinger hit a two-run homer in three at bats before departing.

Bellinger, in the midst of a seven-game hitting streak, is up to .226 on the season with five home runs and 17 RBIs.

He’s a lifetime .257 hitter with 183 career home runs for the Los Angeles Dodgers (2017-22) and Cubs.

Crow-Armstrong, 22, made his major league debut last September and went 0-for-14 with three

walks. He’s batting .203 with two home runs, five doubles and seven RBIs at Triple-A Iowa this season.

**Ravens wide receiver Bateman agrees to 3-year extension**

Baltimore Ravens wide receiver Rashod Bateman on Wednesday agreed to a three-year contract extension through the 2026 season.

Financial terms were not disclosed.

Bateman, 24, had 32 catches for 367 yards and one touchdown in 16 games (12 starts) last season.

He has 93 catches for 1,167 yards and four touchdowns in 34 career games (21 starts) since being selected by the Ravens with the 27th overall pick of the 2021 NFL Draft.

# TikTok CEO expects to defeat US restrictions

WASHINGTON — TikTok’s chief executive said on Wednesday the social media company expects to win a legal challenge to block legislation signed into law by President Joe Biden that he said would ban its popular short video app used by 170 million Americans.  
“Rest assured — we aren’t going anywhere,” CEO Shou Zi Chew said in a video posted moments after Biden

signed the bill that gives China-based ByteDance 270 days to divest TikTok’s U.S. assets or face a ban. “The facts and the Constitution are on our side and we expect to prevail again.”  
Biden’s signing sets a Jan. 19 deadline for a sale — one day before his term is set to expire — but he could extend the deadline by three months if he determines ByteDance is making progress. Biden is seeking a second term against

former President Donald Trump.  
“We don’t want to see a ban,” White House spokeswoman Karine Jean-Pierre said on Tuesday. “This is about PRC ownership,” she added, referring to the People’s Republic of China.  
In 2020, Trump was blocked by the courts in his bid to ban TikTok and Chinese-owned WeChat, a unit of Tencent, in the United States. Trump has reversed course and said on Monday that Biden

was “pushing” for a ban on TikTok and would be the one responsible if a ban were imposed, urging voters to take notice.  
“Make no mistake — this is a ban on TikTok,” Chew said, emphasizing that TikTok would continue to operate as the company challenges the restrictions.  
Many experts question if any potential buyer has the financial resources to buy TikTok and if China and U.S. government agencies would approve a

sale.  
Driven by widespread worries among U.S. lawmakers that China could access Americans’ data or surveil them with the app, the bill was overwhelmingly passed late on Tuesday by the U.S. Senate. The U.S. House of Representatives approved it on Saturday.  
The four-year battle over TikTok is a significant front in a war over the internet and technology between Washington and Beijing. Last week,

Apple said China had ordered it to remove Meta Platforms’ WhatsApp and Threads from its App Store in China over Chinese national security concerns.  
TikTok is set to challenge the bill on First Amendment grounds and TikTok users are expected to again take legal action. A U.S. judge in Montana in November blocked a state ban on TikTok, citing free-speech grounds.

# House speaker heckled and booed at NY Gaza protest

NEW YORK/LOS ANGELES — Columbia University students heckled House Speaker Mike Johnson on Wednesday as he visited the flashpoint of nationwide student demonstrations over the Israeli war in Gaza, even as the New York school agreed to 48 more hours of negotiations to end a protest encampment.  
Johnson’s visit, which he said was meant to support Jewish students intimidated by some anti-Israeli demonstrators, took place shortly after the university extended a deadline from Wednesday morning to Friday morning to reach an agreement to remove an encampment that has come to symbolize the campus protest movement.  
Some of the campus protests taking place coast to coast were met with shows of force from law enforcement.  
In Texas on Wednesday, state highway patrol troopers in riot gear and police on horseback broke up a protest at the

University of Texas in Austin and arrested 20 people.  
The University of Southern California declared its campus closed and asked the Los Angeles Police Department to clear a demonstration. Police arrested students who peacefully surrendered one-by-one, hours after campus police who took down an encampment were overwhelmed by protesters and requested LAPD help.  
Other demonstrations took place at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island, the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge and California State Polytechnic in Humboldt.  
Protesting students have demanded universities divest assets from Israel and seek to pressure the U.S. government to rein in Israeli strikes on Palestinian civilians.  
Israel’s fierce response followed a deadly Oct. 7 cross-border raid by Islamist militants from Hamas, which controls

the Gaza enclave.  
The at times vulgar heckling and booing that greeted Johnson did not drown him out, though he was hard to hear because he spoke to media microphones, not through loudspeakers.  
“As Columbia has allowed these lawless radicals and agitators to take over, the virus of anti-semitism has spread across other campuses,” Johnson said from the

steps of the university library, calling on violent protesters to be arrested and threatening to cut off federal funding to universities that fail to impose order.  
Johnson, whose job as House Speaker has been threatened by ultraconservative Republicans in his caucus, could have expected a cold welcome from students on a New York City campus known as a liberal bastion.

In a politically polarized country, conservatives can score points by being seen as standing up to liberal activists, many of whom say the Republican portrayals of anti-semitic violence on campus are greatly exaggerated for political purposes.  
Johnson also met with Jewish students who said they were fearful to come onto the campus, citing testimony from Jewish students who said they

had been spat on and seen swastikas drawn on the walls.  
Before his press conference, Johnson met with about 40 Jewish students on campus, according to students who were there.  
Students at the encampment say their protest has been peaceful, and that outsiders not connected with their movement are behind any inflammatory confrontations off-campus.

**Arizona House votes to repeal 1864 abortion ban**  
Lawmakers in Arizona’s House of Representatives on Wednesday voted to repeal an 1864 ban on abortion that may go into effect next month.  
In a 32-28 vote, lawmakers decided that the old abortion ban should be repealed. The Arizona state Senate must now also vote to repeal the bill before the 160-year-old ban is knocked down.  
Arizona’s fight over the Civil War-era abortion ban is the latest flashpoint on women’s reproductive rights in the United States since the U.S. Supreme Court ended the constitutional right to abortion in 2022, leaving it up to states to decide the issue. Conservative-led states quickly invoked strict bans on abortion within their borders.  
The old law was revived by a state Supreme Court ruling on April 9, and unless the legislature intervenes, it could take effect within 60 days of that ruling.  
Even if Democrats in Arizona manage to repeal the 1864 abortion ban, restrictions on the procedure would still be in place. Arizona Republicans in 2022 passed a law that bans abortion after 15 weeks of pregnancy.  
**House Democrat Donald Payne Jr. dead at 65**  
WASHINGTON — Donald Payne Jr., a Democrat in the U.S. House of

Representatives who represented a northern New Jersey district, has died after a cardiac episode, the state’s governor’s office said on Wednesday.  
“As a former union worker and toll collector, he deeply understood the struggles our working families face, and he fought valiantly to serve their needs, every single day,” Governor Phil Murphy said in a statement.  
With Payne’s death, Republicans now hold a 218-212 majority in the House, and with a fractious majority at times bucking leadership single votes have the power to change legislative outcomes.  
Payne Jr., 65, was first elected to the seat in 2012, after the death of his father, Donald Payne. The older Payne had

represented the district since 1989.  
**Bird flu tests required for dairy cattle moving between states on Monday**  
CHICAGO — The U.S. government will require dairy cattle moving between states to be tested for bird flu starting on Monday as federal officials ramp up their response to an outbreak that has bled over into the U.S. milk supply.  
Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack on Wednesday said all laboratories and state veterinarians in the country must report positive tests, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture would pay for increased testing.  
The measures aim to contain the spread of bird flu, which has been reported in eight states

and 33 dairy herds since it was first detected in late March in Texas. A person exposed to cattle tested positive for the disease and suffered conjunctivitis.  
Dr. Michael Worobey, an evolutionary biologist at the University of Arizona, said on Wednesday that based on new information, it appears that the H5N1 infections in dairy cattle occurred through a single transmission event from a bird to a cow sometime in late 2023, likely in December.  
**US mandates new airline refund rules, fee disclosures**  
ARLINGTON, Virginia — The U.S. Transportation Department finalized new rules Wednesday requiring upfront disclosure of airline fees and mandates quick cash refunds for canceled flights, as well as for delayed baggage or inoperative services like onboard Wi-Fi.  
The rules, which were nearly three years in the works, will require airlines and ticket agents to tell consumers upfront about baggage or change and cancellation fees. The department said consumers are expected to save \$543 million annually in excess airline fees.  
President Joe Biden has repeatedly heaped criticism on the airline industry over the last two years.  
The new rules require airlines and ticket agents to disclose extra service fees alongside the full

fare, the first time fare and schedule information is displayed online.  
**Grand jury indicts 18 in alleged Arizona fake elector scheme**  
A grand jury has charged 18 people with allegedly taking part in an Arizona fake elector scheme to re-elect then-U.S. President Donald Trump in 2020, the state’s attorney general said on Wednesday.  
The court papers list a “former U.S. president,” Trump, as an unindicted co-conspirator.  
The indictment stems from efforts to reverse Democrat Joe Biden’s victory in several states in 2020, based on Republican Trump’s false claims that he had been re-elected.  
The names of seven defendants are redacted in an indictment that names 11 others. Arizona Attorney General Kris Mayes said in a press release announcing the charges that those names would be made public after all of the defendants had been served with the indictment.  
Trump lawyer Rudy Giuliani is among those indicted, said his spokesperson Ted Goodman, although the former New York mayor’s name is redacted.  
The indictment also identifies one defendant as chief of staff in 2020, the position Mark Meadows held in the Trump White House at that time.  
Representatives for Meadows and Trump did not immediately respond

to requests for comment.  
U.S. presidents are chosen by electors from each state, who cast votes in the Electoral College, where votes are allotted based on each state’s population.  
**First full-size sugar vessel reaches Baltimore refinery after accident**  
NEW YORK — A full-size vessel carrying raw sugar was able to navigate through the 20-foot deep temporary channel at the Patapsco River on Wednesday and reach the Port of Baltimore for the first time since an accident blocked access to the port almost a month ago.  
The vessel The Jonathan carried supplies for the large sugar refinery operated by the ASR Group — the company that makes Domino Sugar — located at the Port of Baltimore.  
The plant, which is one of the largest sugar refineries in the United States, has faced hurdles to keep operations at normal levels since the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge on March 26 that killed six people.  
At that time, ASR Group said it had stocks to keep the refinery working for around six to eight weeks.  
ASR Group said on Wednesday that a couple of smaller boats had managed to reach the refinery before Wednesday, but with much smaller cargoes.

# Israel plans all-out assault in south Gaza

CAIRO/JERUSALEM — Israeli warplanes pounded the northern Gaza strip for a second day on Wednesday in a fierce assault that has shattered weeks of comparative calm, and Israel said it was moving forward with plans for an all-out assault on Rafah in the south.

After an abrupt Israeli pullback at the start of this month, Palestinians at both ends of the Gaza Strip were again fleeing for their lives from bombing they described as some of the war’s worst.

A spokesperson for Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu’s government said Israel was “moving ahead” with its plans for a ground operation on Rafah but gave no timeline.

Western countries, including Israel’s closest ally the United States, have pleaded with it to hold back from attacking the city on Gaza’s southern edge, which is sheltering more than half the enclave’s 2.3 million people.

At the White House, U.S. national security adviser Jake Sullivan said Washington was still talking with Israel about Rafah and officials from both countries expected to meet again in person soon.

“We’ve had very detailed discussions ... to talk through not just our

concerns, but our view that there is a different way to go about dealing with the Hamas threat in Rafah,” he told reporters.

A senior Israeli defense official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Israel was poised to evacuate civilians ahead of its attack and had bought 40,000 tents that could

house 10-12 people each. All that remained was for Netanyahu to give the order.

Displaced people sheltering in Rafah are weighing whether to flee again. Tamer Al-Burai, who fled from Gaza City and is now living in Rafah in a cluster of tents with seven

households of extended family, said the entire group was heading to the north “since Israel sounds more serious in its threats this time.”

“We have women, children, elderly and sick people, who may face problems escaping should the invasion happen suddenly,” he told Reuters

over a chat app. “Invasions happen under heavy fire and people die as they leave. So we decided we should leave earlier.”

**Hostage video**  
At the opposite end of the Gaza Strip in the north, the city of Beit Lahiya came under

massive shelling for a second day on Wednesday, a day after the Israeli military ordered residents out of four districts declared a “dangerous combat zone.”

Israel said its operations there targeted areas from where the armed wing of Hamas-aligned Islamic Jihad fired rockets at two Israeli border settlements on Tuesday.

Israel has said it will eradicate Hamas following the militant group’s rampage in southern Israel on Oct. 7 in which 1,200 people were killed and 253 were taken hostage, according to Israeli tallies.

Hamas released a video on Wednesday that apparently showed Israeli American hostage Hersh Goldberg-Polin, 23, alive. His father, Jonathan Polin, urged leaders to reach a ceasefire deal.

“We’re relieved to see him alive but we’re also concerned about his health and wellbeing as well as that of all of the other hostages and all of those suffering in this region,” his father said in a video message.

The war, now in its seventh month, has killed more than 34,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza health authorities. The offensive has laid to waste much of the enclave, displacing most of its 2.3 million people and creating a humanitarian crisis.

# Haiti transition council to be installed Thursday

PORT-AU-PRINCE — A ceremony to install a stalled presidential transition council in Haiti will take place Thursday morning on the outskirts of the capital Port-au-Prince, the office of outgoing Prime Minister Ariel Henry announced in a statementon Wednesday.

The statement noted that the ceremony will be hosted at the prime minister’s official office, known as Villa d’Accueil, not the downtown National Palace, which has come

under repeated fire from armed gangs in recent days.

Earlier on Wednesday, powerful gang leader Jimmy “Barbeque” Cherizier insisted that talks over Haiti’s political future must include the gangs.

The installation of the nine-member presidential transition council that will take over from Henry has been delayed for weeks amid intense behind-the-scenes jockeying for control among various political factions.

The establishment of

the council is seen as a key first step toward ending the chaos that has engulfed the Caribbean nation, largely blamed on rival gangs fighting over turf, especially in the capital, as well as mostly absent state institutions.

The council is expected to name an interim prime minister and help set up a government that will eventually organize national elections.

**Spain’s PM suspends public duties to ‘reflect’ on future**  
MADRID — Spain’s Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez said on Wednesday he would step back from public duties for a week to decide whether he wants to continue leading the government after a court launched a business corruption probe into his wife’s private dealings.

Sanchez, who last year secured another term for his Spanish Socialist Workers’ Party (PSOE) as leader of a minority coalition government, said he would appear before the media on Monday to announce his decision.

“I need to pause and think,” he wrote in a letter shared on his X account. “At this point, I have to ask myself: is it all worth it? I honestly don’t know... whether I should continue to lead the government or renounce this honor.”

**South Africa extends troop deployment**  
JOHANNESBURG — South Africa’s military will extend the deployment of its troops in conflict-hit Mozambique and Democratic Republic of Congo, President Cyril Ramaphosa said in a

statement on Wednesday.

The extension, for an unspecified amount of time, will keep 1,198 personnel of the South African National Defence Force in eastern Congo, where they are part of a U.N. peacekeeping force helping Congo fight rebel groups.

The statement also said that 1,495 SANDF members would continue their operations in Mozambique, where they have been supporting the government’s fight against violent extremism in northern areas since 2021.

South Africa’s military deployments abroad have come under domestic scrutiny this year, after two SANDF soldiers were

international sanctions led by Washington.

The country “will protect its sovereign rights and security interests from increasing hostile threats and sanctions pressure from the United States, and take stronger real actions to make its already established military and technological strength irreversible,” the official added.

**Brazil’s government working on historic tax overhaul**  
BRASILIA — Brazil’s government submitted proposed rules to Congress on Wednesday to carry out a historic tax overhaul approved last year, a key element of President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva’s strategy to foster growth in Latin America’s largest economy.

The Finance Ministry said in a statement the bill contains most of the regulations needed to implement the constitutional amendment approved last year, and that a second proposal will be sent to lawmakers in the coming days specifically addressing management and oversight of the new taxes.

The reform’s goal is to enhance productivity by streamlining Brazil’s complex tax framework,

known for burdening businesses with significant compliance costs.

The reform consolidates five existing levies into a value-added tax (VAT) with separate federal and regional rates, to be determined through the complementary bills. Full implementation of the new taxes is expected only in 2033.

**Brazil justice says no evidence Bolsonaro sought asylum**  
BRASILIA — Brazilian Supreme Court justice Alexandre de Moraes on Wednesday closed an investigation into whether former far-right president Jair Bolsonaro sought asylum at the Hungarian embassy in February, citing lack of evidence.

The New York Times revealed via security video footage that Bolsonaro spent two nights at the Hungarian embassy in Brasilia between Feb. 12 and 14, right after his passport was seized in an investigation into an alleged military coup plot.

“There are no concrete elements that indicate ... that the investigated party intended to obtain diplomatic asylum in order to flee the country and, consequently, jeopardize the ongoing criminal

investigation,” Moraes said in a written decision.

The embassy stay aroused suspicions that he might seek diplomatic asylum to avoid the coup plot probe and other criminal investigations.

**Cuba apologizes to Canada for delivering wrong body to grieving family**  
HAVANA — Cuba apologized to Canada on Wednesday after authorities accidentally delivered the remains of another man to a Canadian family grieving the loss of a loved one who died while vacationing on the Caribbean island in March.

Faraj Jarjour, a Canadian citizen of Syrian descent, died of a heart attack in the Varadero beach resort two hours east of Havana on March 22, according to a report by Canada’s CBC news agency.

Weeks later, his family was shocked to find the body of a tattooed man many years younger in the casket delivered from Cuba to a funeral home near Montreal, the family told the CBC. The body delivered looked nothing like their father, the family said.

Reuters
